The Evolution of Policing • The British Contribution: - Mid-eighteenth century England experienced significant social change - London was under siege • Criminality was rampant • Punishment was disproportionate - The Bow Street Runners • Henry Fielding - magistrate of Bow Street • Noted the disproportional punishment

The History of Policing in the United States

The development of policing in the United States closely followed the development of policing in England In the early colonies policing took two forms It was both informal and communal, which is referred to as the "Watch," or private-for-profit policing, which is called "The Big Stick" (Spitzer, 1979)
