in medieval and early Tudor writing and thought became, by the last decades of the sixteenth century, a powerful, ubiquitous, and highly exploitable instrument of propaganda Like their medieval counterparts, most mid-Tudor and early Elizabethan monsters suffered from some sort of physical deformity, and it should be empha-
